Salon78: Out and Loud - The Gay Liberation Quire 1981-87


There was an enthusiastic audience for our forum, *Salon78: Out and Loud - The Gay Liberation Quire 1981-87*, on Sunday 9 December 2018 at the Beresford Hotel. Three members of the Quire spoke and joined with other Quire members in the audience for an impromptu performance.

David Abello discussed the history of the Quire, illustrated with a number of photos by David Urquhart. Maree Marsh and Paul Van Reyk then shared their personal stories about activism and singing.

This forum was the first in our *Salon78* series, celebrating the upsurge of activism following the first Mardi Gras - both political and cultural activism.

After the forum, Kerry Bashford shared this lovely post on Facebook:

This afternoon I attended a reunion of the Gay Liberation Quire in Sydney. It was a remarkable opportunity to revisit what was a key aspect of my coming out into the queer community. I arrived in Sydney shockingly shy and awkward, unfashionably political and unable to fit into any scene I encountered. The Quire not only gave me a chance to find my voice but to share it in unison with an inclusive, inspiring group of lesbians and gays who served as not only musical companions but mentors as well. I got to perform not only at rallies of every left wing cause imaginable; I was left with a songbook of solidarity that I've never forgotten.

2019 Parade and Fair Day

The elected SGLMG 78ers Committee is the key forum for liaison between 78ers and Mardi Gras. First Mardi Gras Inc. members of the committee are Betty Hounslow, Diane Minnis, Kate Rowe, Helen Gollan and Lance Mumby. Lance recently replaced Ross Duffin who resigned after moving interstate. Prior to this year's AGM, 78ers Committee members assisted Mardi Gras to check whether applicants for 78er Life Membership were 78ers.

78ers will soon be sent a survey regarding joining the 78ers contingent in the 2019 Parade (2 March) and whether you and your partner or friend need seats on the bus. The survey will also ask for volunteers to help staff the 78ers tent at Fair Day on Sunday 17 February.

Sydney Gay and Lesbian Mardi Gras Life Membership for 78ers

At this year AGM on 27 October, a further 68 78ers were admitted as Life Members. There was spirited and healthy debate on a range of motions, including Police participation in the Mardi Gras Parade. It was good to see the availability of the Mardi Gras workshop increased for community groups and some younger Directors elected or re-elected.

NSW Police Apology

On 9 August, NSW Police Commissioner Mick Fuller gave an official apology to 78ers on behalf of the Police Force for the actions of Police 40 years ago. On 24 June 1978, Police violently attacked participants at the first Mardi Gras Parade and subsequent protests.

Five 78ers - Peter Murphy, First Mardi Gras Inc. member Sandra Banks, Sue Fletcher, Gay Egg and Mark Gillespie - gave powerful speeches that brought tears to the eyes of audience members. In addition to an unreserved apology, Commissioner Fuller committed the Police Force to never repeating the abuse suffered by 78ers. He later took up Sue Fletcher's challenge to improve LGBTIQ education programs in schools following the demise of Safe Schools. Sue Fletcher, Peter Murphy, Diane Minnis and Wanda Kluke are now working with NSW Police on this project.

On 14 September, Robert French was one of 18 recipients of the inaugural ANZ Australia and Sydney Gay and Lesbian Mardi Gras LGBTQI Community Grants. Robert's grant is for the digitisation of LGBTIQ radio programs from 1968-96.

On 1 October, Garry Wotherspoon was announced as this year's winner of the OutStanding LGBTIQA Short Story Competition.

On 9 October, Sandra Gobbo, David Abello, Kate Rowe and Robert French spoke to the Macquarie University Queer Collective as part of LGBTQIA+ history month. The 78ers had a great time engaging with young activists.

On the evening of 9 October, Diane Minnis and Karl Zlotkowski spoke at Macquarie University's Dunmore Lang College which has held an LGBTIQ+ dinner for three years.

On 10 November, Karl Zlotkowski addressed the Let's Educate Equality rally protesting discrimination against LGBTQIA students and staff in private schools.

Robert French gave a paper at the Queer Legacies, New Solidarities' Conference, held in Melbourne from 22-24 November.



On 3 October, First Mardi Gras Inc. member Robyn Kennedy won the LGBTI Community Hero Award for her commitment to the LGBTI community spanning over four decades.

Over the years, Robyn has advocated for LGBTI rights through various roles with groups such as CAMP, Gay Solidarity and Gay Task Force. As a 78er, Robyn has been a vital force in the development of First Mardi Gras Inc., a community not-for-profit association established to support the 78ers.

The President's Award went to CAMP Inc. and was accepted by 78ers Peter de Waal and Robyn Plaister; joined by Ian Black, who chaired the first public CAMP Inc. meeting. Shirleene Robinson of the Marriage Equality Campaign and Pride History Group President took out the Media Award.

the parade will start at 5pm in Baylis Street, with a free after party at the Union Hotel.



Pakistani gay couple Talhia and Zain married in Australia earlier this year. Zain is an Australian citizen, but Tahlia needs to apply for permanent residency. The application fee is \$7000, an impossible sum for the couple - one a student and one in a low-paid job. They reached out to 78ers to help via *gofundme* and \$6,645 was raised. Tahlia and Zain thank 78ers and other donors who supported them.
